

(1) The Eel Pie

9-11 Church Street

This popular cosy Hall & Woodhouse pub was converted from a wine bar in 1982. It is now a traditional styled friendly pub. The bar is decorated with interesting rugby memorabilia. Badger First Gold, Sussex Bitter, Tanglefoot, Guest beers (River Cottage Stinger Organic Nettle beer).

(2) The Fox TFA CM

39 Church Street

This popular 17th century Inn provides a good choice of real ales and home cooked food, and is reputed to be one of Twickenham's oldest pubs. This is a typical old fashioned boozier with a friendly atmosphere. Fuller's London Pride, Deuchars IPA, Twickenham Fine Ales, Guest beers.

(3) Smollensky's Metro Bar & Grill

20-24 York Street

Smollensky's opened in 2005. The ground floor is the bar and food which is always available, is served upstairs. No draft real ale.

(4) Hook Line & Sinker CM

29-31 York Street

A newly built town centre pub owned by Fullers and under new management since August this year. London Pride, Discovery, & ESB, Some guest beers may be introduced in time.

(5) The Bear

26-28 York Street

Nice and relaxed pub with pleasant décor that was converted from an All Bar One. Greene King IPA, Shepherd Neame Spitfire, Wells Bombardier, Young's Special and/or Bitter and an impressive range of interesting bottled beers.

(6) Up 'n' Under

33-35 York Street

This recently built corner site free house pub (an ex Hogshead) has live music on Friday nights, Sky TV showing live football and all sports on their big screen plus a jukebox — a genuine retro Wurlitzer with all the classics as well as regular updates. They pride themselves on their gastro style home made food and 'mega' Burgers. Real ale sometimes.

(7) Twickenham Tup

13 Richmond Road

This is a large spacious pub with high ceilings and good seating capacity. It was originally the Glass & Bottle when built in 1635 but was completely rebuild in the 1900s as the Royal Oak. The 'Tup is a big sport viewing venue for Rugby where it can get quite packed for a big match. Live music Friday & Saturday night. Deuchars IPA, Shepherd Neame Spitfire, Wells Bombardier.

(8) Clubhouse TFA

65 Richmond Road

Opened in 2002 this new style Free house was formerly the Mulberry Tree, and also been a Mongolian BBQ restaurant. It is now run by the previous owner of the White Swan on the riverside. There are large sofas in the main bar area for relaxing with the daily papers. Sports screen. Good food menu and a Sunday Roast. Quiz night on Wednesday. Outside there is a 'Secret' floodlit garden. An extensive range of good food is always available. Fuller's London Pride, Twickenham Fine Ales, Guest beer.

(9) Old Anchor

71 Richmond Road

The Old Anchor dates from 1897 when Young & Co bought it as a beer house. It gained a full licence in 1949. The pub like many in the area suffered some damage during WWII and was later altered to extend the saloon bar in 1966. The atmosphere is friendly. Sunday lunches, using only locally sourced organic ingredients are very popular. In summer, the ample paved back garden is an attractive drinking area. Young's beers.

(10) Crown

174 Richmond Road

Dating from around 1690 and Grade II listed this spacious and but basic uncarpeted pub has two real fires in the winter months and ample seating. Home made food available. There is a car park and a large garden and a dedicated play area for children. Fuller's London Pride.

(11) The Rising Sun

277-279 Richmond Road, Marble Hill

This pub is a recent Young's acquisition of a former large Whitbread pub with an equally large car park. Today the pub retains much of its previous size which is spacious and comfortable. Live music is now a significant feature on Thursday, Friday, Saturday & Sunday with 'open' Mic, Jam sessions, and special artists. Thursday is Twickenham Jazz Club – there is an entry fee on most music nights. The pub also offers a range of food and a Carvery. There is an outside seating area. Young's beers.

(12) Barmy Arms CM

The Embankment

This is one of Twickenham's two riverside pubs and dates back to 1722 when it was then called the Queen's Head. During winter the two fires add to the cosy nature of this pub. There is a covered and heated outside patio area overlooking the river. The outside bar only selling Real Ale during special events. Young's Bitter, Deuchars IPA, Adnams Broadside, London Pride, Guest beers.

(13) White Swan

Riverside

This is the other of Twickenham's two riverside pubs and is Grade II listed. It is thought that it became an Inn between 1690 and 1722. The White Swan is a small traditional unspoilt 'real' pub with wooden floorboards and sparse furnishings that is reached from the road by a short flight of steps. There is a small TV in the bar. You can oversee the river from the outside balcony and three-sided room with window seats. During the winter months there is real fire in the bar and the back room. It is complemented with a seated area which teeters on the river's edge outside the Inn and across a narrow road. This is a very popular pub during the summer for its outside seating. Wells Bombardier, Adnam's Broadside, Timothy Taylor Landlord and Deuchars IPA.

(14) Sorting Room TFA RC CM

24 London Road

A large lively modern bar opened in 2003 and converted from what was Twickenham's main Post Office. It is dominated with the younger set at weekends, but during the day it is used by shoppers, families and office staff. Food is available all day, Twickenham Fine Ales, Courage Directors, Courage Best or Pedigree, Guest beer on occasion. Three ciders on hand pump are Western's Organic Vintage, Bound's Brand and Old Rosie.

(15) Codee's Bar (at the Rugby Tavern)

68 London Road

A modern garishly painted bar close to Twickenham Station. The small bar - which is packed with keg dispensing units - is very much sport orientated and well known to Rugby fans. Wells Bombardier.

(16) The Albany Pub and Dining Room

1 Queens Road

The Albany was renovated and transformed into a 'Gastro pub' in 2005. The pub is a large Victorian building with a front terrace. Because of its location away from the main streets it is often missed but is only 2 minutes from Twickenham Station; turn right just before The Cabbage Patch. Wells Bombardier, and occasionally Ruddle's County.

(17) Cabbage Patch CM

67 London Road

This is a large family run corner pub. There are six separate seating areas, catering for all tastes with a good range of food available. The pub was reopened in September 2004, after a refurbishment. A firm favourite with Rugby fans on match days at Twickenham Stadium. The pub is the home of the famous Eel Pie Club that can be found upstairs. There is also an extensive paved patio area around the side and at the back. Fuller's London Pride, Greene King Old Speckled Hen, Deuchars IPA, Wells Bombardier, Adnam's Broadside.

(18) Misty Moon

53/57 London Road.

A friendly pub with plentiful seating with reasonably priced beer and food. The Décor's is typical Wetherspoon who were the previous owners. Green King IPA, Fuller's London Pride, Courage Directors, + Guest beers.

(19) Filthy McNasty's

11 London Road

This S & N pub previously known as the Hobgoblin closed down at the end of August 2006 and the 'live' music it hosted moved to the Red Lion in Heath Road. It is now closed. How this pub is to be redeveloped is unknown.

(20) George

32 King St

Old Grade II listed coaching Inn, now heavily modernised with ample seating. Live music at week-ends., Wells Bombardier, Greene King IPA or Fuller's London Pride, Guest beer on occasion.

(21) Three Kings

52 Heath Road

1920s basic corner pub with wooden floor popular with Rugby fans denoted by the many framed Rugby shirts around the walls. Note the 'B' on the outside wall, the former Brandon's Brewery motif. Courage Best, Fuller's London Pride sometimes available or when there is a big sporting event. Occasional live music.

(22) Red Lion (Filthy McNasty's)

166 Heath Road.

Large corner pub within easy reach of the town centre, popular for its entertainment: Live music every night, Fuller's London Pride. This pub is the new home of 'Filthy Nasty's' when the London Road pub closed down at the end of August 2006.

(23) Kings Arms TFA

40 Albion Road

A large and imposing back street corner pub built in 1926. Inside is rather spartan with a long bar and a wooden floor. A section has been separated off as AJ's Kitchen that serves above average pub food. Fuller's London Pride, Twickenham Fine Ales, seasonal beers.

(24) Prince Blucher CM

124 The Green

A lively, popular traditional pub built in 1815 which has been significantly expanded into four separate bar areas to suit most tastes. The enthusiastic landlord offers home made food all day and in summer puts on hog roasts and BBQs in the ample child-friendly patio garden. Food Festivals are also a regular feature. Fuller's beers: Chiswick, London Pride, ESB and seasonal beers.

(25) Sussex Arms

15 Staines Road.

A traditional and friendly Victorian single bar pub near Twickenham Green. It has a large well kept garden at the rear that is largely undiscovered.. Fuller's London Pride, and Abbot Ale when Rugby events on.

(26) Prince Albert CM

30 Hampton Road.

Originally called The Star in 1840, the pub later became unofficially known as "Wiffen's" after a 3-generation landlord family (whose name is still visible behind the bar). Nowadays, this is a thriving and popular traditional pub with a convivial atmosphere. There are 3 separate seating areas and a sports screen. In summer, drinkers can use the attractive garden and patio. Fuller's house; Chiswick, London Pride, ESB and seasonal beers.

(27) Rifleman TFA

7 Fourth Cross Road

A charming backstreet local pub which was originally a 19th century beer house. Small patio at the front. Courage Bitter, Young's Bitter and Twickenham Fine Ales; Original or seasonal

(28) Prince of Wales TFA

136 Hampton Road.

This Inn dates from around the 1850s and served as the final staging post on the Windsor to London Stagecoach route. Evidence of its connections with Isleworth Brewery can still be seen. There is a large and pleasant secluded garden. The manager is passionate about his real ales that are always in top condition. This is a spacious single bar pub with four hand-pumps serving, Shepherd Neame Spitfire, St Austell's Tribute and two beers from the local Twickenham brewery.

(29) The Old Goat TFA

241 Hampton Road

A 1932 built landmark corner pub previously known as The Fulwell Arms has recently been refurbished and also offers B&B. The new owners describe it as a modern pub with traditional values. The pub has plenty of seating and is effectively divided between the front and side bars and restaurant areas which extend into a large conservatory at the back. There is also a paved patio area and garden. Since becoming the Goat Inn this pub has become very popular. They have an extensive menu of good quality home made food which is available at most times. Courage Best, Twickenham Fine Ales, Guest beers and Belgian bottled beers

(30) Fountain

1 Sixth Cross Road

1939 roadhouse converted to a Beefeater restaurant with a large and comfortable seating area. There is also a large garden area at the back. Fuller's London Pride, Green King's Old Speckled Hen.

(31) Winning Post

Chertsey Road. Whitton.

A landmark on the A316, that is only accessible by car from the eastbound carriageway. This large traditional styled pub accommodates a Carvery style restaurant and a large function suite. A Premier Lodge Motel is situated at the rear. Walking access from Whitton Station is via Jubilee Ave or off Percy Road. Only one cask beer usually available, Young's, Tetley or Wells Bombardier.

(32) Admiral Nelson

123 Nelson Road. Whitton

Large landmark pub on a busy junction at the end of the High Street. Although a walk-through, there is distinct separate drinking areas, including one designated non-smoking, and a small patio. Fuller's beers.

(33) Prince Albert

54 Hounslow Road. Whitton.

In 1855 a Persian immigrant was credited with running the Prince Albert Beer Shop as it was known. Today little has changed to its front appearance and it is very much a locals' pub. Irish music on Thursday evenings. There is a small car park on the side and a small rear garden. Fuller's London Pride

(34) White Hart Inn

121 Kneller Road. Whitton.

This historic family owned Pub is the oldest surviving pub in Whitton and dates back to 1685 and has been designated a building of townscape merit. Rebuild after a fire, the structure retains some of the original timbers as an attractive feature. It's popular for its interior style and huge beer garden. Beware of the uneven floor. Wells Bombardier and occasional guest beers rugby days. Limited parking at the front.

(35) Duke of Cambridge TFA CM

Kneller Road Whitton.

The Pub was previously a residential home called Emma Cottage and became a beer house in the same year as the Military Music School opposite was established. The current pub name was first recorded in 1861. It's now very much a small friendly locals' pub opposite the historic Kneller Hall. The toilets have now been completely modernised and rebuilt and a large semi enclosed extension/decking area with outside serving hatch is being constructed on the car park side to capitalise on it being the closest pub to the Twickenham Rugby ground. This friendly pub has a very large garden. Greene King IPA, Fuller's London Pride and Twickenham Fine Ales Sundancer.

(36) Ailsa Tavern

263 St Margarets Road

Well located large Victorian pub. Seating can be in short supply when busy, especially for popular quiz night on Thursday. Sports fans are well catered for. Side door leads to a Beer garden with plenty of seating. Fuller's London Pride and Wells Bombardier.

(37) Turks Head CM

28 Winchester Road

This back street Fuller's pub has recently been renovated but still remains a genuine local corner pub. It became famous in the 60s when it was used in a scene for the Beatles film 'A Hard Days Night'. The Bearcat Comedy Club operates here every Saturday night and the pub also hosts live R&B music every Friday night. Fuller's beers.

(38) St. Margarets Tavern

107 St Margarets Road.


150 years ago this was a temperance hotel called the Lord Lyon. Its present name dates from 1881 when it became an ordinary station pub. However, after significant extensions and restyling were made recently, this large pub has been revitalised and is now very popular. There is plenty of seating and an outside patio area and car park. Good range of food served all day. Normally six cask beers on offer, including London Pride, Timothy Taylor Landlord, Well's Bombardier, Deuchars IPA.

(39) Popes Grotto

Cross Deep

This large comfortable and spacious Young's pub overlooks Radnor Gardens and the River Thames beyond. There is a sports screen and dedicated tables for food which is fresh and prepared by a French Chef. The bar is air conditioned. Outside is a narrow seating area and small car park. The old original Pope's Grotto built by Young & Bainbridge in 1852 was bombed during WWII and replaced by a temporary hut until it was rebuilt in 1959. The pub's original layout has been altered since with the inclusion of a 32 room three star hotel. There is a Link cash machine on the premises which is also a Wi-Fi Zone. Young's Bitter, Special and seasonal beers.
